Our Mission



The Sacred Portion Children's Outreach is a non-profit organization dedicated to providing for the needy children of the world who are without homes or families.

Formerly known in our community as Southwood Child and Family Education Center, the organization was directly involved for 22 years in the development and operation of an early childhood program. In 1997 the organization passed the care and continuation of that program into another's hands and the founders, Craig and Jan Druckenmiller, turned their hearts towards serving a more needy population of the world's children.

The organization, as part of its new mission seeks to assist facilities that care for orphaned and abandoned children in providing healthy, secure environments in which these children can grow and develop as normally as possible.

A Bright Future

As the tropical sun beat down on the audience seated in the Chinese garden at the Rehoboth Children's Home, Ronnie and the other preschoolers each took a turn delivering a short speech they had memorized on what they want to be when they grow up. Their little monologues were statements typical of kids that age -

dreams of being a fireman, a pilot, a nurse, a schoolteacher. As I listened to their darling efforts at presenting in English, I contemplated what these children's futures would be and the role that the Rehoboth Children's Home has in setting that course.

This was the first time, since the inception of the Rehoboth Early Learning Center, that the timing of one of my trips to the Philippines actually coincided with the annual graduation ceremony. So, it was fun to be present for the festivities. Philippine culture is very big on pomp and ceremony, even at the preschool level! On April 5, complete with hats and gowns, the preschoolers graduated from their respective levels including nursery, kindergarten and preparatory. There were speeches, performances, diplomas, and special awards such as "Best Blockbuilder", Best at Painting", etc. I was given the honor of "confirming" the graduates. Two of the Rehoboth children, Jerick and Rommel, attend the private Christian school that is



located on the property directly behind the orphanage. So, I attended

that graduation ceremony as well. Rommel was honored with an Achiever of the Year award and Jerick with Achiever of the Quarter. I accompanied Rommel to the stage to receive his award and Fe, the Deputy Administrator of Rehoboth, accompanied Jerick. We felt quite proud of our very smart Rehoboth boys.

Giving the children a jump start with their educational development is a high priority at the Rehoboth Children's Home and an area in which The Sacred Portion Children's Outreach has a special interest. Our focus begins with the very youngest children. We know the damage that can be inflicted upon children's development from early infancy when



attachment to and interaction with a primary caregiver is absent, when children are left alone in cribs for hours on end and when no one responds to their needs. We know the importance of providing developmentally appropriate learning environments and stimulation to trigger the wiring of brain circuitry for cognitive functioning. At the

Rehoboth Children's Home, a favorite first learning game that I see the caregivers playing with the infants is saying, "Open, shut, open, shut", to which the baby learns to respond by opening and shutting his fist. Although much of this type of interaction between the children and caregivers occurs spontaneously throughout the day, it's not enough to leave it to chance. The Sacred Portion Children's Outreach has been



training the staff on the implementation of an Active Learning program. Through this program, each infant receives pre-planned stimulation activities every day appropriate for his developmental level. These activities encompass the areas of language, motor development, creative and cognitive functioning. For the toddlers at Rehoboth, a planned activity time takes place each morning that includes art activities, blocks





and manipulatives, puzzles, or imaginary play schemes. The preschool age children attend the Rehoboth Early Learning Center which is located on the premises. A full curriculum of preschool activities helps the children gain knowledge about their world and develop skills and concepts that will provide a foundation for later learning. The children at Rehoboth who are elementary age attend the private Christian school next door.

Besides laying the first building blocks of education, the Rehoboth Children's Home sets the future course of the children in another important way. Rehoboth's adoption program ensures that each child's stay in the Home will be only temporary and that they will move on to that for which there is no substitute - a family. This will soon be the case for Ronnie and his younger brother Jayson. These two boys came to the Rehoboth Children's Home from another orphanage that was shut down by the Department of Social Welfare and Development for mistreatment of the children. They came to Rehoboth without a history as the prior orphanage had done

no paperwork or follow-up after the boys had come into that facility. Eden, the social worker at Rehoboth, has worked tirelessly with the court system to get Ronnie and Jayson declared abandoned and legally cleared for adoption, a process that has taken several years. With the legalities now complete, we expect that Ronnie and Jayson will be matched with an adoptive family very soon. With a loving family to guide and support him, the future for Ronnie will be bright - filled with hope and limitless possibilities. Who knows...perhaps Ronnie will become a military commander some day, Justin a pilot and Racquel a doctor.



The future lies waiting and the staff at Rehoboth are dedicated to setting the children on a positive path with good nutrition, preventative health measures, developmental stimulation and education. But they also desire for the children to carry with them into the future memories that would be typical of a "normal" childhood. A week or so after returning home from the Philippines, I received some photos via e-mail of the older kids at Rehoboth "camping out" for their summer vacation. In the Philippines, summer break occurs during the months of April and May which is the hottest time of the year. The staff constructed "tents" from sheets, ropes and even a parachute in one of the garden areas at the Home and the kids slept outside. Special activities such as camping out and splashing in waterfalls provide the type of fun that make our own childhood memories



so special. Children growing up in orphanages deserve nothing less. School will start up again in June. But, for now, the notebooks and pencils are set aside and it's time to just be a kid.

Early Learning

The Rehoboth Early Learning Center and the Children of Hope Preschool are two early learning programs that were developed by The Sacred Portion Children's Outreach. The Rehoboth Early Learning Center is located on the premises of the Rehoboth Children's Home and serves the children in residence at the Home as well as a limited number of children from the community. The Children of Hope Preschool is part of the elementary school that serves the children living at the Children's Shelter of Cebu. The Sacred Portion Children's Outreach fully equipped both of these early learning programs and Jan Druckenmiller wrote the curriculum. Both preschools follow approximately the same teaching sequence. So, while the children at RELC on the island of Luzon were learning about magnets, so were the children at COHS on the island of Cebu!

The children spent a week exploring and discovering the properties of magnets. They used magnetic wands to move magnetic marbles and paper clips through water. They played with puzzles with magnetic pieces and a magnetic auto lifter. They "fished" with magnets from the



rocking boat and worked with a "to stick or not to stick" discovery board. Art activities included using magnets to drag paper clips through paint which made interesting designs. The children also had fun getting their birds to stick in their magnetic trees that each of them made.

ADDRESSING THE HEALTH NEEDS OF CHILDREN

One of the greatest challenges in the residential care of children is the area of health. Children often enter the child caring facility in poor health, displaying malnourishment, parasites, skin infections and a host of other medical issues. With proper care and attention, these conditions can be usually be remedied and the children brought back to a healthy state. An ongoing challenge, however, is the maintenance of children's health in a group care setting where infections and illnesses are easily transmitted.



Marlys Healy is a dear friend who, along with her husband Paul, founded the Children's Shelter of Cebu in Cebu City. The Healys have devoted the past 29 years of their lives to running CSC. Marlys is a nurse and the medical director of CSC. I called upon her to do a session for the caregivers at

the Rehoboth Children's Home on health, sanitation and medical issues. I made a trip to Cebu to visit CSC for a few days and then Marlys flew back to Manila with me. It was great to have her visit the Rehoboth Children's Home and to have some

time together.

During the seminar, Marlys covered topics such as medical testing of children upon intake, immunization schedules, isolation of sick children, treatment of skin rashes and common illnesses, management of children with parasites, medical record keeping, hand washing, sanitation measures related to diapering and bottle preparation, and safety issues. The seminar was very informative and helpful. The caregivers were able to affirm for themselves those health management procedures that they were already doing and were also made aware of areas for improvement. We are very grateful to Marlys for her willingness to take time out of her own very busy schedule to travel to Rehoboth and do this presentation for us.



A Portion of Love Child Sponsorship Program

It is critical for the Rehoboth Children's Home to develop a support base for the ongoing operation of the Home. While other types of contributions and gifts can be sporadic or seasonal, a sponsorship program provides a predictable and consistent income for the Home by which to meet the daily needs of the children for food, clothing, and medical care. In addition to providing a stable income base, the sponsorship program is an opportunity for others to become involved and have a role in providing love and care that can transform the life of a child. A child sponsor can be an individual or couple, a Sunday School class, youth group or civic organization. Once a sponsor is matched with a child, they will receive a description of their child and how he or she came to be at the Rehoboth Children's Home. Regular updates and pictures will be provided throughout the year. Sponsors will have the opportunity to send letters, cards and small gifts to their sponsored child.

The sponsorship amount is \$25 per month. Since it costs more than \$25 per month to provide for the many needs of a child at the Rehoboth Children's Home, a sponsor's gifts will be combined with others to form an extended family of support for their sponsored child.



REHOBOTH EXPANSION PROJECT CAPITAL CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE



Last October we spent nine days with the team from Engineering Ministries International (EMI) at the Rehoboth Children's Home to develop a master site plan for the expansion of the Rehoboth Children's Home. The expansion will take place on a 5 acre tract of land located directly across the road from the current facility. By the end of the nine days, EMI had hammered out a preliminary site plan with three phases of development and an estimated cost for each phase. Our first priority is to expand the orphanage by building BONNIE'S HEART BABY HOME so that more children can be served. However, our bigger vision is to address what causes children in the Philippines to be abandoned by their birth families, namely poverty and a lack of resources. Thus, the master site plan includes community outreach in the form of a medical clinic, vocational training facility, education foundation and other services to support families and help them rise above their circumstances. After a six month process of each EMI team member diligently working on their assigned part of the design, we are close to having a finalized site plan with detailed drawings and schematics. We are looking at a \$1 million price tag to build all three phases of the project and another \$1 million endowment to support the operation of the expanded facilities. So, how does one go about raising that kind of money especially when you've never done it before??? Understanding our clueless condition as to how to even begin, God graciously sent us someone to help. Tim Hart, a local realtor with marketing and fundraising experience, heard our presentation at the Evangelical Free Church and contacted us, expressing a desire to help. Since that time, Tim has successfully organized a CAPITAL CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE for the Rehoboth Expansion Project. The committee is composed of community people who have been touched by the vision and are committed to helping us raise the funds. The people on the CAPITAL CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE will be developing contacts of potential donors and helping to tell the story of the children in the Philippines for whom we strive to give the hope of a brighter future. Our goal is to raise the funds for Phase I and begin construction by January, 2009. 


If you read our past two newsletters, you are well acquainted with Victor's story. Victor participated in Summer of Hope 2006, coming from the Children's Shelter of Cebu to spend four weeks with a host family in Bozeman, MT. Victor had a great summer and his host family planned to adopt him until unforeseen circumstances torpedoed their plans. By then it seemed too late to bring another family on board as the paperwork process typically takes six months or longer. Victor would turn 16 in November at which time he would "age out", no longer able to be adopted according to Philippine adoption law and U.S. Immigration Services. But God provided in Victor's 11th hour. The Watling family from Minnesota, having learned about Victor, went through the paperwork process at break neck speed with everything being finished shortly before Victor's birthday. The Watlings traveled to the Philippines in December to bring Victor

home. Nancy Watling's mother, who was living in Bozeman, passed away while they were in the Philippines. Nancy made a trip to Bozeman in early January for the memorial service. I met Nancy and Kathy Boman, Victor's host mom, at a local restaurant for a few hours one afternoon. I was excited to meet Nancy and even more

excited that Nancy and Kathy could meet each other. They shared stories about Victor and Nancy brought a photo album of their trip to Cebu and Victor's arrival home. As we visited, I marveled at the roles each of these women had played in setting the course for Victor's future. Kathy, putting aside her own disappointment, selflessly acted out of love for Victor and became a stepping stone for another to become his adoptive mother. Nancy stepped forward in faith and courage to embrace the challenges that come with parenting a child who only came to be yours at the age of 16! Both of these women are champions in my book and I will, for years to come, remain in awe of how clearly we saw God work in this situation. He did not leave Victor as an orphan (John 14:18) nor did He allow Victor's hope to be cut off (Proverbs 23:28).



POST ADOPTION SUPPORT SERVICES

This past November, in celebration of National Adoption Awareness Month, The Sacred Portion Children's Outreach launched its new POST ADOPTION SUPPORT SERVICES. Our goal is to effectively address the needs of adoptive families after adoption through get-togethers, parent support groups, and courses and workshops related to parenting adopted children.

We started off with an ADOPTIVE FAMILIES GET TOGETHER/POTLUCK on November 11 at the Evangelical Free Church. In addition to good food and visiting, we took some time collectively as a group to discuss what people wanted in terms of post-adoption support services. A big thanks to those families who turned in their POST ADOPTION SUPPORT SERVICES SURVEY. It was very helpful to us to get this feedback.

On November 29, we presented a two hour preview of a video course entitled "POWER TO PARENT." Eight couples signed up to take the eight week course which ran from January 17 through March 27. We actually stretched the course to ten weeks so that we could have two sessions devoted to just discussion. The Power to Parent course was developed by Dr. Gordon Neufeld, a developmental psychologist



and award-winning author. Dr. Neufeld's approach to parenting resonates deeply with us and is highly applicable to families with adopted children. Lynda Springer, trained facilitator for the Power to Parent course, has agreed to do it again in the fall. On January 27, we hosted another Adoptive Families Get Together which was a SLEDDING PARTY AND CHILI FEED at the Lindley Center. We had a good turn out for this event and even had some new families attend whom we hadn't met before.

Now that we have completed the Power to Parent series, it is our intention

to get our PARENT SUPPORT GROUP going. This group will meet one Thursday a month at the Evangelical Free Church. Child care will be provided.

Parenting adopted children comes with many challenges and no one should have to go it alone. Isolation is your worst enemy. Getting plugged in with others whose experiences and struggles are akin to your own can be a great source of support and encouragement.

Through our Post Adoption Support Services, our aim is to present a HOPEFUL APPROACH to raising adopted children.

Adoption Fundraising Program

The Sacred Portion Children's Outreach is able to allow families to fundraise for their adoptions through our organization, thus providing donors with the benefit of a tax-deductible contribution. Families typically send out a letter that has been pre-approved by us to family and friends, inviting them to participate in their adoption by making a contribution. Several families have also put on fundraising events that included a dinner, carnival, silent auction, raffle, photo op, door prizes, etc. It's a great way to get people involved, creates adoption awareness and has been quite successful for the families who have tried this approach.

The BAILEY BEAR Fundraiser is another way that families can raise money for their adoptions. These darling little bears come dressed in t-shirts that say, "I Helped a Child Find a Home."



In addition to the Adoption Fundraising Grant program, families can apply to The Sacred Portion Children's Outreach Adoption Assistance Fund for interest-free loans and grants.
